# **Reflections On...** Matthew 13:44

"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up. Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field."

What do we learn about the kingdom of heaven from this short parable? The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure hidden in a field. Immediately we are to understand the great value that is associated with the kingdom of heaven. When I read the word treasure, my mind pictures a treasure map with a dotted line weaving around some deserted island until it reaches the "x" on the map that marks the spot. If someone has access to the map and can read it properly, they can take possession of that treasure. But that's not the case with the treasure and the one who finds it in the parable. There is no indication from the text that the man was looking for the treasure. It is clear the treasure was hidden in the field. There were probably many who had passed by this treasure before but did not see it. Perhaps the man who finds it had himself passed by it many times before. But this, I don't believe is the most important part of this parable. We're not told how the man found the treasure. We are simply told that he found it. And upon finding it, he immediately recognized its value. How do we see this? Well, he covered it up. He hid it again. You may think that seems like a stingy thing to do. This isn't even his field. Shouldn't he go tell the owner of the field about what he found. Here again we would be missing the point of the parable. The parable is showing us the value of the kingdom. It is a treasure and the man who finds it wants to ensure that he does not lose it. He wants this treasure, he needs this treasure, so he hides this treasure. But that's not all. He joyfully sells all his possessions so he can buy this field and take possession of this treasure. He knows the treasure that he has found is of far greater value than all he currently possessed. Parting with his possessions isn't something he laments. It's not difficult for him at all. He is filled with joy because he has found something better. Nothing will keep him from taking possession of this field so that he can possess this treasure.

What about you? Is this the way you feel about the kingdom of heaven? Maybe you're asking, "What is the kingdom of heaven?" The short answer is the kingdom of heaven is the kingdom in which Christ reigns as king. It is not like the kingdoms of this world. It transcends this world. It is not temporal but eternal. "For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him" (Col. 1:16).

How does one become a citizen of this kingdom? It shouldn't surprise you that only the king of the kingdom can let you in. He lets all who call upon him in. He isn't a distant king living in a palace far removed. He dwells among his people. He isn't hard to access. He is the one knocking at the door.

To become a citizen of this kingdom all you must do is open the door. What does that mean? It means realizing that you need Christ as savior and submitting to him as Lord. Citizens of the kingdom of heaven realize that it is only by God's grace that they are citizens of the kingdom. Because they were sinners, they were enemies of the kingdom. But God sent Jesus the king to pay the penalty for their sins and bring them into the kingdom. Through faith in Jesus, we are citizens of the kingdom of heaven.

Much more can be said about the kingdom of heaven, but again let me ask, do you see the kingdom of heaven as treasure worth selling everything else in your life for? That's what the man in this parable did. With a heart filled with joy he took possession of this treasure.
